

## WHARTON CENTER TO OFFER SENSORY-FRIENDLY PERFORMANCES

EAST LANSING, MI – Wharton Center is proud to announce a new programming initiative: beginning in the 2017-2018 season, several live theatre productions will include Sensory-Friendly Performances for children and adults with autism spectrum disorder and other sensitivity issues.

“We know that for people with sensory sensitivities – a group that includes many who are on the autism spectrum – attending a live theatre production can be a minefield of potential challenges. Wharton Center’s mission is to make theatre accessible to everyone,” noted Executive Director Mike Brand. “In addition, we are hoping that the entire family can come to Wharton Center to relax and enjoy what we offer in a friendly, welcoming environment.”

Sensory-Friendly Performances feature accommodations such as:

- Lower sound levels and the elimination of potentially startling special effects and lighting.
- House lights and stage lights will remain on at a low level throughout the performance.
- Audience members may stand and move around as needed.
- There will be designated quiet and activity areas available to patrons.
- Trained volunteers and professionals will be on hand during the entire event.
- Sensory supports (earplugs, noise-cancelling head phones) will be available in the lobby.
- Trained volunteers will provide crafts and activities an hour-and-a-half prior to the performance to the end of the performance.

Wharton Center’s Director of Patron Services, Nina Silbergleit, said, “We have long been an advocate and provider of accessibility services for our patrons. Providing Sensory-Friendly Performances and the training for staff in regard to supporting patrons with sensory sensitivities is a wonderful opportunity to expand our existing services.”

This season, Wharton Center’s Sensory-Friendly Performances include:

- *Dr. Seuss’s The Cat in the Hat* on Sunday, October 29, 2017 at 1:00 p.m.
- *Clementine* on Sunday, March 25, 2018 at 1:00 p.m.
- *Disney’s The Lion King* on Saturday, July 21, 2018 at 2:00 p.m.

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This program will extend beyond the 2017-2018 season. "Ultimately, Wharton Center intends to create a sustainable program that will continue sensory-friendly offerings well into the foreseeable future," says Diane Willcox, Wharton Center's Director of Marketing and Communications. "It just makes sense when we know that according to the Center for Disease Control, a new case of autism is diagnosed in the United States every 15 minutes, and an estimated one of every six children is affected by neurological conditions that require treatment and special considerations. Our goal is to reach families and individuals affected by these issues and offer them a place in which they can feel welcome and comfortable."
